
On June first we held our annual Future Farmers of America Dance.



### THE POWER OF POSITIVE PERSUASION

The Patten Academy Eagles opened the 1962-63 season with one returning letterman from a squad which reached the Eastern Maine Class M Basketball Tournament in 1962. With the loss of seven seniors, the season was a building year with the varsity squad being composed of a majority of underclassmen.

The inexperienced Eagles dropped their first three games of the season by close margins. Lee Academy and Mattawamkeag each gained a four point verdict with the games being tied at one point in the last quarter.

A typical Island Falls-Patten game took place in Patten with the Elks capturing a 65-60 verdict. The game was tied many times with the lead changing hands every few minutes. Patten led at the end of the first and third quarters and Island Falls regained the lead at half time and at the end of the game. With the loss of Don Adams via the foul route in the fourth period and the inability to set their sights on the basket in the last frame, the Eagles suffered their fourth defeating six starts.

Patten absorbed two of its worst beatings in many years when Sherman, K. V. L. Champs, defeated the Eagles 80-33 and Island Falls came back to hand them a 74-32 beating. Both teams later went on to win berths in the Eastern Maine M and S Tournaments respectively.

Mattawamkeag arrived in Patten fresh from an upset of Island Falls and were looking forward to clinching a top spot in the K. V. L. when the Eagles, hungry for a victory, eased out a hair-raising 48-46 victory.

The Eagles took to the road and were unsuccessful in jumping into the win column as Ricker came from behind with three minutes left in the ball game to edge the hapless Eagles 53-52. The Patten Visitors gained a comfortable six point lead going into the final quarter, but the inability to score a basket from the floor proved to the guests undoing.







The 1962 Patten Academy baseball team ended the year with a 4-6 record. The record of games runs as follows:



# Boys' and Girls' State

Boys' and Girls' States were held on the University of Maine and the Colby Campuses respectively. The representative to Girls' State was Linda M. Anderson, sponsored by the Student Council and the representative to Boys' State was Leslie A. Dickinson, Jr. sponsored by the Parent Teachers Association. The tuition to Girls' State was thirty-five dollars and that to Boys' State was forty dollars.

Both Boys' and Girls' States were dedicated to the learning of the local and state governmental processes through actual participation. Girls' State was divided into six towns and three counties organized under the mythical state of Dirigo. Boys' State was organized into eight towns and four counties under the same state name, Dirigo.

The representatives from the individual schools stayed at Girls' and Boys' State five days, the girls being there from June 15th-21st and the boys, from June 17th-22nd.

During this time, the participants (325 at Girls' State, and 480 at Boys' State) elected such town officials as selectmen, a school board, and discussed and voted on bills brought forth in an imaginary town report. They voted on such important issues as a new school building and the placing of new street lights.

On the county level each town nominated candidates for county officer and they were voted upon in a county election.

On the state level the boys and girls in each respective state were divided into two parties, Nationalists and Federalists. Each party held a Caucus and a primary election to choose their candidate for the general election. In both Boys' and Girls' State the Nationalists Party won the Governor's chair and a majority in the Senate and House of Representatives.

Linda Anderson won the primary election for the House of Representatives in the Federalists party, but was defeated along with other party members in the general election.

Leslie Dickinson ran for Governor for the Federalists, was defeated before the primaries, got in the primaries as a candidate for Clerk of Court, was defeated in the general election but later received appointment as assistant State Historian.

Both Girls' and Boys' State held very impressive graduation ceremonies at which all representatives received a diploma and an alumni card.

Linda and Dickie spoke before the P. T. A. on September 10, 1962, about their experiences at their respective states and will speak again this spring before a school assembly.






