




His POD classes not only brightened our day, but also gave us insight into some of the difficulties we will encounter in the outside world.

All day long we work preparing food, helping the men, and with the shadow of night comes the noise of gunfire and bombs.

Last week I saw my first American. He was at the river with several South Vietnamese boys and I could not understand the strange tongue they spoke. His manner was as foreign as his words. He moved cuickly, intelligently, and with assurance. His face was open and friendly, yet it held warning. Here was a man who knew that, should he be killed, the cause would not be lost.
