




The "Mighty, Mighty" Seniors under the guidance of Mrs. Harvey, have a total of thirty-one class members.

The girls basketball team of Patten Academy has finished its 1966-67 season with an impressive 11-2 record. Both losses for Coach James McKenna's team were to Sherman High. Patten placed second in the Katahdin Valley League. Darla Craig was the leading scorer for Patten with 178 points on the season, an average of 13.7 points a game. Louise Birmingham has an average of 12.4 with 149 points on the season, while Martena Lyons has a game average of 11.8 and 163 total points. Rounding out the well balanced acoring for Patten was Ann Morse with 92 points, for an average of 7 per game. As a team, Patten chalked up 607 points, good for 46.7 per game. While doing this, they held their opponents to 374 points, for 28.7 per game. Leading the defensive unit were Lois Richardson, Vicin Somers, and Maureen Birmingham. Louise Birmingham will represent Patten in the Katahdin Valley League foul shooting content at Island Falls.



Under the Title I-B of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, S.A.D. #25 sponsored a Summer Youth Corps Project. This program was designed primarily to provide full or part-time work experience and training for students recruited among the low income families.

Nine students were employed from Patten. They received \$1.25 per hour, worked a maximum of 32 hours per week, and were required to contribute one hour per week of their own time for guidance and counseling meetings.

The students performed their tasks with enthusiasm, and from observation, took great pride in what they accomplished.

Although not professional laborers, by and large the work of the Youth Corps members would easily pass for professional work. Among the outstanding accomplishments were the following: exterior painting of Sherman High School and floor sanding done in Patten schools.



A History Of Patten Academy

In the middle 1800's, Patten was a thriving community with energetic, industrious citizens. Feeling the need for an institution to educate their children, the townspeople decided to plan the construction of an academy.

On June 18, 1847, the governor of Maine signed into law the bill that incorporated the Trustees of Patten Academy. The trustees were given part of a township to sell to raise money for building the Academy, and along with donations, enough money was raised to construct the building.

The first Patten Academy was finished in 1848 and opened its doors on the second Monday of September. It stood where the primary building is now located.

As with the tradition of earlier private schools, the principal taught all the classes, with the help of able assistants from the student body. The students ranged in age from ten to twenty-two and came from towns in the surrounding area. The classes were ungraded, and there were no graduation exercises. The students took the courses they wanted and left when they thought they knew enough.

The principals came and went quickly and each brought new inovations to the Academy.

In 1873, the Maine legislature passed an act which enabled towns to unite with private academies to give free education to all children of school age. The town agreed to pay a set sum to the trustees of the Academy for schooling the children of Patten. Thus Patten Academy became a public school

In the ensuing years, specific courses were set up, and a graded system established. The first yearbooks and school papers were published.

The first official graduation was held in 1887. In the year following, a grammer school was set up in the Academy Hall.

On November 9, 1897, in the early morning the old Academy went up in flames. The fire was a tragedy to the townspeople, but they soon recovered. While the new Academy was being constructed, classes were held in the I.O.O.F. Lodge Hall.

The people decided to construct a free Patten Academy where the Academy presently stands. As now, the townspeople thought the amount of money necessary to construct the new building outrageous, but at length enough money was appropriated and the building completed. Dedication services for the new building were held on the afternoon of December 12, 1898.

In the following years new grading systems were experimented with and new courses introduced.

In 1904, the Bonney Literary Society was created by H. R. Palmer. This organization is noteworthy in that it helped develop the speaking and writing ability of the students. It served as an influential and enterprising organization until 1923 when the meetings were discontinued.

For the first time, in 1904, and attempt was made to establish an alumni association in the hope of arousing an interest in the Academy among former students.

Sports became increasingly important to the delight of the students at the Academy and the townspeople. Baseball was the first organized sport. Later a track team was established and basketball and tennis were introduced. The boys at Patten Academy were outstanding athletes and brought home honors in may fields of athletics. The girls, not to be out done, organized a basketball team in 1907.

In 1909, the first Athletic Association was organized which presented letters to the students for participation in football, basketball, baseball, and track.

In 1909, the students began to urge the construction of a gymnasium and athletic field for the various teams to practice on. To their disappointment, enough funds were not appropriated for building a gym, but when the town hall was built, several years later, the students found an adequate place for their athletic games. After much work, the field behind the Academy became the athletic field.

With the coming of the war in 1916, several of the students entered the armed forces. With their return, the participation in extracurricular activities increased. In the same year, a Parent Teachers Association was organized. Three new courses were introduced: home economics, manual training, and agriculture.

In 1923, the first winter carnival was held. The tradition of the winter carnival was continued for many years with all the schools in the Katahdin Valley League participating.

In the same year, a Student Council and National Honor Society were established and have continued for the benefit fo the students ever since.

The agricultural shop was added to the Academy building in 1927. In the same year, the first annual Father and Son Banquet was held for the boys in the agricultural course.

In 1928, a 4-H club was organized along with a French club. The local chapter of the Future Farmers of America was incorporated a year later. A Latin club was also organized.

The town hall, where extracurricular activities were held, burned in December of 1940. Thanks to donations of the loyal alumni of Patten Academy and the insurance collected on the old town hall, the Founder's Memorial Hall was completed and dedicated in August of 1941.

During the years of the Second World War many of the activities came to a full stop. The school year was so arranged that the students could work and help to aid the labor shortage that developed and also comply with their educational demands.

The following years brought a continuation of former activities with the resuming of sports, numerous plays, speaking contests, and the like.

The year 1947 brought about a great honor that will always be held in the hearts of the citizens of Patten. The outstanding, energetic team of ten P. A. boys combined with the enthusiastic ability of coach and principal, Willis Phair, made an invincible team.

Playing an excellent season of games, the boys were invited to the Eastern Maine Small Schools' Tournament held in Brewer. Imagine the excitement!

The first game Patten played was with Milo, a team slated to be victorious. Skill and determination was the sixth man as the Eagles won 37 to 31. This was just the beginning. The second team Patten faced at the tournament was Limestone. The Eagles were on the road of glory as they swooped to a winning score of 40 to 21. This earned the fast moving group the right to play for the Eastern Maine Championship against Lawrence High School.

The turnout of spectators was tremendous as the Patten fans overflowed the streets of Bangor and Brewer. The enthusiastic sportsmanship displayed by the loyal fans was excellent as they cheered their Eagles on to win 43 to 42.

The next sup for the Eagles was a giant one. They were scheduled to play Gould Academy for the State Championship. Were they able to do it? Four bus loads of Patten's people thought so and they were right. The exuberant Eagles swiftly and skillfully took the Championship with a 36 to 33 score.

Pandemonium reigned as the Eagles were brought back to Patten. The fans were filled with admiration and pride.

On March 22 the Eagles' fame went down in lasting history. The setting: Boston Garden; the reason: to compete for the honor of the New Championship against Boston Latin. Boston Latin had an enrollment of 1,800 boys as compared to Patten's total en-



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


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


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
